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

GENERAL RULES FOR PEDAL TRACTOR PULLING

- 1. The event will be for children ages 4-12 years old
- 2. Each participant must register prior to the starting of their age group.
- 3. Rules of Conduct by Participants
- A. The child may not place their hand on the tractor tire at any time during their pull to help increase their pulling distance.
- B. The child may not place one or both feet on the ground to push their tractor forward.
- C. There can be no loss of forward pressure. In other words, they can not hesitate or never jerk the equipment.
- D. The child will always remain in the seat. If a contestant lifts off the seat, the pull will be stopped, and their distance will be measured to that point.
- E. All participants must be wearing shoes, no bare feet (we would suggest tie or velcro shoes that cover the foot and give traction to the pedal.)
- 4. Any arguing with the track officials by a contestant, parent or guardian will not be allowed and could result in disqualification of the contestant. We will display sportsmanship in all cases, and should that not be possible, the offender will be asked to leave. No one is perfect but we will handle things in the proper way.
- 5. All rulings by track officials are final and may supersede any of the above rules. In the case of need, a sled may be reweighted, and the group may start over.





THE FOLLOWING POLICIES HAVE BEEN ESTABLISHED AND AUTHORIZED BY THE BELMONT COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE 2025 BELMONT COUNTY FAIR.

- No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature, post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertising material, or sell or distribute any merchandise, except persons in contracted concession or commercial rented spaces.
- 2. Disorderly people will be removed from grounds and illegally parked vehicles will be towed from grounds at owner's expense. Vehicles are prohibited from parking around the livestock barns.
- 3. NO alcoholic beverages or drugs are permitted on the fairgrounds or in the camping areas. Violators will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately and will not be permitted to return to the fairgrounds the remainder of the 2025 fair. In addition, violators will not be permitted on the fairgrounds or in camping areas for the 2026 fair.
- 4. Concealed weapons are prohibited in buildings on the fairgrounds.
- 5. Handheld laser devices, build-up games, helium tanks or helium filled balloons are prohibited. Violators will be subject to possible dismissal from the fairgrounds at the discretion of the concession manager and/or the Belmont County Agricultural Society.
- 6. ALL DOGS OR PETS (EXCEPT HELPER DOGS IN USE BY THEIR OWNER AND DOGS BEING USED IN CONTRACTED PERFORMANCES) ARE PROHIBITED ON GROUNDS OR IN EXHIBITION BUILDINGS AND MUST HAVE PROPER I.D.
- 7. Official veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture Allie Cain, Large Animal Vet.
- 8: Vet must check and sign off all deceased or sick species before they leave the fairgrounds.
- 9. All bills must be presented by November 1, or they will not be paid within the fiscal year. All checks not cashed within 60 days will be voided and payment refused.
- 10. The Belmont County Agricultural Society is not responsible for printing errors in the 2025 Belmont County Fair Handbook.
- 11. Lost and Found Department is located at the Secretary's Office, located next to the Carnes Center and Main Entrance.
- 12. No Refunds No Rain Dates.
- 13. No one non-ambulatory allowed in the arenas during shows and sales.
- 14. Not responsible for loss/damages to vehicles while parked in parking areas

Code of Conduct Policy

Anyone attending events either as an exhibitor, advisor, volunteer, parent, spectator, superintendent, judge, committee member or fair official and staff must conduct themselves in a manner consistent with this Code of Conduct and according to the Rule and Regulations of the Belmont County Agricultural Society. These codes of conduct and rules are not limited to the show ring, but are applicable to any event held at the Belmont County Fairgrounds including, but not limited to meetings, workshops, clinics, contests, shows, county fair, etc. Consequences to violating this code of conduct may include but are not limited to:

- Verbal warning
- Written warning
- Removal from Fairgrounds
- · Suspension, reduction and/ or loss of premiums or prize monies
- Loss of future show privileges
- Loss of privilege to be on Fairgrounds property

The act of making an entry in the fair, participating, and/or attending such events on the Belmont County Fairgrounds Is giving verification that you will abide by the code of conduct and understand the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code.

Exhibitors, Advisors, Volunteers, Parents, Family Members, Spectators, Superintendents, Judges, Committee Members, and Fair Officials and Staff MUST:

- Be responsible for your own behavior/conduct and uphold high standards for the group and accept consequences for inappropriate behavior
- Support and abide by the rules set forth by Fair Board, Superintendents, Committees, and Clubs
- Practice good citizenship, leadership, and self-governance
- Follow the direction of staff
- Demonstrate positive sportsmanship and attitudes at all times
- Be courteous and respectful to others
- Use appropriate language at all times
- Respect and adhere to guidelines of the Belmont County Fair Code of Conduct and all rules and regulations that apply to participation/ competition.

Behavior, Conduct, and Activities Not Permitted at events held at the Belmont County Fairgrounds and at Ohio State University Extension Activities related to the Belmont County Fair.

- Unsportsmanlike, unethical, immoral conduct
- Improper language, (i.e., profanity)
- Bullying, intimidation, belittling
- Possession or consumption of alcohol (Except at Fair Board approved events)
- Possession or consumption of illegal drugs, including the use of tobacco by a minor
- Possession or use of weapons or fireworks (Except with prior approval from Fair Board)
- Possession or use of harmful objects with the intent to harm or intimidate others
- Destruction of property (i.e., graffiti)
- Violation of established curfew
- Disrespect for adults, other participants, volunteers, staff, and or leaders of the event
- Postings, listings, pictures, and clothing that are deemed inappropriate on fairgrounds or on Social Media forums.

The Belmont County Fair Board of Directors reserves the right to remove any person, at their discretion, from the grounds who violates the Rules & Regulations and/or the Code Of Conduct. The Belmont County Fair Board of Directors Reserves the right to amend, change or add to these rules and regulations as they, in their judgment, may deem advisable. All Belmont County Fair Board of Directors decisions are FINAL.

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ENTRIES

- 1. All exhibitors shall be required to have all open class entries in the hands of the Fair Secretary, Becky Selmon, and fees paid by 5:00 p.m., Saturday, August 9, 2025 by mail or in person as follows:
- (a) Mail your entries and fees, postmarked on or before August 9, 2025, to Belmont Co Fair Secretary, 45420 Roscoe Rd. St. Clairsville, OH 43950
- (b) In person at the Secretary's office on the fairgrounds.

Office Hours: 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m on the following dates: Friday, August 1, 2025, Saturday, August 2, 2025, Friday, August 8, 2025, Saturday, August 9, 2025, Saturday, August 16, 2025, & Saturday, August 30, 2025.

Sunday, August 31, 2025 from 12:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m. or by appointment.

- (c) Late entries will be accepted at the discretion of the Secretary or Department Superintendent if space is available.
- 2. All exhibitors must purchase a \$25 membership ticket (if a resident of Belmont County and age 18 or over) or a \$40 season ticket (if not a resident of Belmont County and/ or under age 18). In addition, entry fee must be paid as listed in Department 1-4.
- 3. Entries once entered upon the books of the Secretary cannot be withdrawn for the purpose of entering the same in another section or class or in the same section or class.
- 4. No refunds will be made on entries received.
- 5. Members of the same family will not be permitted to compete for the same kind of article without paying an additional entry fee. "Family" means the immediate family of an exhibitor, including but not limited to the exhibitor's parent, stepparent, foster parent, grandparent, step-grandparent, foster grandparent, brother, sister, stepbrother, step-sister, half-brother, half-sister, son, daughter, step-son, stepdaughter, or guardian.
- 6. Unless otherwise listed, no exhibit is to be entered in the name of any other than the bonafide owner.
- 7. None but the department superintendent(s) of the Belmont County Agricultural Society will be permitted to examine the books before premiums are awarded.

- 8. In order to protest an entry in either Open Class or Junior Fair, the following guidelines and procedures must be followed.
- (a) The protest must be submitted in writing to the Department Superintendent within 24 hours of action being protested.
- (b) Before any further action is taken, a \$100 deposit must accompany the written protest.
- (c) Immediate Action will be taken after review of the protest first by Junior Fair Board of Directors (if a Junior Fair entry), then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors Executive Committee and then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society Board of Directors for a final decision on the matter.
- (d) If the protester is correct, the \$100 deposit will be returned. If the protester is ruled incorrect, the \$100 deposit becomes the property of the Belmont County Agricultural Society.



EXHIBITS AND JUDGING

- 1. Exhibitors shall receive a card or cards containing the number and class for entries made by the secretary. This card (s) is required before exhibits are placed on fairgrounds.
- 2. All livestock must be in place on the fairgrounds by 4:00 p.m., Monday, September 1, 2025. No animals on grounds before 4:00 p.m., Sunday, August 31, 2025. Open Class Beef & Dairy tack arrival is 12:01 a.m. – 8:00 a.m. Sunday, August 31st.
- 3. All Domestic Arts and Horticulture exhibits must be in place by date and time listed in the rules of each department and/or section of the fair handbook.
- 4. All open-class animals may leave the grounds between 12:01 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. Sunday, September 7th. Any animals not off the fairgrounds by 10:00 a.m. must remain on the grounds until 5:00 p.m., Sunday, September 7th. All other exhibits, including commercial and concession displays, must remain in place until 5:00 p.m., Sunday, September 7, 2025.
- 5. Any exhibitor in open class or junior fair will forfeit premiums and be barred from exhibition at the fair the following year if exhibit removal time is violated without approval from Josh Lude & Mark Stephens.
- 6. The Department Superintendents and Committees will take every precaution in their power for the preservation of all articles on exhibit after their arrival and arrangement on the grounds but will not be responsible for loss or damage.
- 7. When there is but one exhibitor of several animals or articles in the same class, first, second, or third premium will be awarded according to the merit of the exhibit.
- 8.If an animal or article is not deemed worthy of a premium, the judge will not make the award.
- 9.The decision of the judge(s) is final.
- 10.It is the duty of the Superintendent of the various departments to assist the awarding committee in finding the articles on exhibition and see that none shall be overlooked.

ADDITIONAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

- 1.No more than two entries per exhibitor in each of the single classes and no more than one entry per exhibitor in each of the group classes.
- 2.All exhibitors must give the total head of livestock when making entries.
- 3.The Department Superintendents reserve the right to take measures prior to assigning entries to pens or stalls during the fair that may be deemed necessary to protect the health of livestock shown at the fair.
- 4. Registration papers must be available upon request.
- 5.No bedding will be provided.
- 6.Any animal entered for exhibition in one class cannot compete for a premium in any other way except as one of a pair or herd.
- 7.No person other than the officers of the Society, judges, exhibitors of the stock and invited guests will be permitted to enter the ring where stock is being exhibited, and these will have places assigned them by the Department Superintendents.

- 8.The standard authority in all cases of pedigrees of livestock shall be the recognized "record" of such class or breed. All animals must be registered when shown for pure blood if they are of the proper age for registration.
- 9.The Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors Reserves the right to test for drugs or disqualify any and all animals at their discretion at the 2025 Belmont County Fair.
- 10.All stalls are to be cleaned by the exhibitor following the removal of the animals.
- 11. Any violation of these regulations will forfeit premiums.
- 12.Entry fees are as follows: \$5.00 per class for all beef and dairy cattle and \$2.50 per class for all goats, llamas, and alpacas except for championship classes.
- 13.Five (5) Single Day Passes will be issued to each livestock exhibitor who exhibits 5 or more animals.
- 14.All Inspection and Health Requirements of Livestock Exhibition In Ohio apply.



Violations to rules in this book are subject to review by the Junior and Senior Fair Board to determine eligibility in the current and upcoming fair. Any misconduct or action of individuals on the fairgrounds that would be deemed unsafe or not listed/addressed in this fair tab, are subject to review by the Junior and Senior Fair Board following the procedure of 1st offense - verbal warning, 2nd offense – written warning, and 3rd offense – Ineligible to show current and following year and livestock and/or projects must leave the grounds immediately. Eligibility for future fairs will be discussed by both boards after removal from grounds. Belmont County Sheriff's Department will assist in any matter that is deemed necessary by Junior Fair Coordinator(s) and/or Senior Fair Board. Dismissal from participating in current fair and removal from grounds may come before written warnings when deemed necessary by both Junior Fair Board and Senior Fair Board (Belmont County Sheriff's office used as needed).

Participation in the Belmont County Fair as a Junior Fair member is both a privilege and an opportunity to showcase accomplishments, interests, and values. All projects must be created within the current registration year and specifically completed to fulfill the requirements of the Junior Fair organization.

Youth who exhibit a project or display an animal at the fair are eligible to receive armbands to cover the cost of daily admission. The price is \$5.00 per registered Junior Fair member and \$10.00 per approved adult volunteer. To qualify, all registration details, armband requests, and fees must be submitted to the Senior Fair Board Secretary by 5:00 p.m. on August 1 of the current year. No exceptions will be made.

Armbands must be requested for exhibitors and approved volunteers through a single Junior Fair organization. County fair exhibits are voluntary and are only for members who have completed their projects.

1. "Thank You" Notes Requirement:

- All trophy & award winners must submit a "Thank You" note to their trophy sponsor. "Thank you" notes are available at the Junior Fair Board Office.
- "Thank You" notes must be written and turned in to the Junior Fair Board Office before a trophy will be released.

Animal Awards:

• Animal trophies will be awarded at the end of each show for photo opportunities, but these trophies must be returned to the Livestock Show Arena, where they can be picked up after 4:00 p.m. on Saturday after the conclusion of the JR. Fair Award Ceremony, as long as a completed "Thank You" has been submitted to the Junior Fair Board Office.

Still Project Trophies:

- Trophies will remain in the trophy booth in the Jr. Fair Building throughout the week.
- They can be picked up after 4:00 p.m. on Saturday after the conclusion of the JR. Fair Award Ceremony, provided a "Thank You" note is turned in to the Junior Fair Board Office.

Deadline for Trophy Pickup:

• All trophies must be picked up from the Livestock Show Arena or Jr. Fair Building by 7:00 p.m. on Sunday.

"Thank You" Notes After the Fair:

• If a "Thank You" note is not written during the fair, it can be submitted to the Belmont County OSU Extension Office after the fair, at which point the trophy will be released.

OPK Award:

- Outstanding Project Knowledge (OPK) must submit a "Thank You" note to their award sponsor. "Thank you" notes are available at the Junior Fair Board Office.
- 2. ALL Junior Fair premiums will be paid to club advisors after the close of the current year's fair. Premium money then will be distributed by the club advisor to the exhibitor. Premiums will only be awarded if the exhibitor has COMPLETED AND EXHIBITED PROJECTS.
- 3. In order to protest an entry in either Open Class or Junior Fair, the following guidelines and procedures must be followed.
 - (A) The protest must be submitted in writing to the Department Superintendent within 24 hours of action being protested.
 - (B) Before any further action is taken, a \$100 deposit must accompany the written protest.
 - (C) Immediate action will be taken after review of the protest first by Junior Fair Board of Directors (if a Junior Fair entry), then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors Executive Committee and then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society Board of Directors for a final decision on the matter.
 - (D) If the board votes in favor of the protest, the \$100 deposit will be returned to the protestor. If the board votes against the protest, the \$100 deposit becomes the property of the Belmont County Agricultural Society.

GENERAL JUNIOR FAIR GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES

ALL 4-H AND FFA MEMBERS ARE REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE IN LIVESTOCK SKILLATHON AND MUST ATTEND A QUALITY ASSURANCE TRAINING SESSION TO BE ELIGIBLE TO EXHIBIT AND SELL AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR. ALL BELMONT COUNTY YOUTH MUST HAVE LIVESTOCK QUALITY ASSURANCE CERTIFICATION BY JUNE 1, 2025.

HORSE PROJECTS ARE NOT REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE IN LIVESTOCK QUALITY ASSURANCE BUT MUST COMPLETE THE EQUISTEP PROGRAM EACH YEAR.

ALL YOUTH EXHIBITING MARKET AND LACTATING ANIMALS MUST COMPLETE A DRUG USE NOTIFICATION FORM IN ORDER TO EXHIBIT AND SELL AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR. THESE FORMS ARE TO BE SUBMITTED ONLINE BY WEIGH-IN ON MONDAY OF THE FAIR.

All Junior Fair Livestock must be in the possession of the exhibitor by each department's deadline date (see deadlines in each department).

The animal's housing location must be declared on each of the respective registration forms. Animals must be under the care of the member and can only be housed on the family's or quardians property. "Family" means the immediate family of an exhibitor, including but not limited to the exhibitor's parent, step-parent, foster parent, grandparent, step grandparent, foster grandparent, brother, sister, step-brother, step-sister, half-brother, half-sister, son, daughter, step-son, stepdaughter, or guardian. If a member is unable to keep their project animal on their property and does not have a "family" member that can keep their project animal, the member must complete a Housing Exemption Form to be filled out and returned with the registration form. Each form will be considered by the Junior Fair Livestock Committee for approval. After each department's registration deadline date, random spot checks will be made by Senior Fair Board members and Junior Fair Livestock Committee members to assure that animals are tagged properly. Anyone knowingly switching or replacing animals after the possession date will be disgualified from showing or selling at the Belmont County Junior Fair during the current year. These random spot checks may occur until time of fair.

The Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors reserves the right to test for drugs or disqualify any and all animals at their discretion at the Belmont County Fair.

GROOMING

All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fair. Market animals should be washed, brushed, and dried only. Conditioner and fly spray are permitted for use (NO ADHESIVES). Sleeves, blankets, ice packs, ice, wet towels, or drenching is NOT permitted. No chiropractic services, laser, Magna Wave, or similar devices are to be used on the fairgrounds. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/ she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year.

4-H/ FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. It is required that the members be present and actively participating in preparing the project animal(s) they are going to show.



General Livestock Rules Continued...

If an animal is weighed and does not make weight:

- The animal will be removed from the scale immediately.
- The scale will be reset to zero.
- No feed or water will be provided to the animal.
- The animal must remain in the designated area and cannot return to the barn or trailer.
- The animal may be re-weighed only once.
- Animals that still do not meet the weight requirement will be disqualified from showing in any market classes. However, they may still participate in the Under/ Overweight and/or Showmanship classes.

UNDER/OVERWEIGHT ANIMAL SHOW RULES

- 1. Eligibility for Under/Overweight Classes:
- Animals that do not meet the weight requirements for their respective species will be placed in an Under/ Overweight class.
- Only animals deemed healthy and fit for exhibition by the fair veterinarian will be eligible to participate in the Under/Overweight classes.
- 2. Show Participation:
- Animals in the Under/Overweight classes may participate in the species-specific show but will not be eligible to sell in the Livestock Sale.
- These animals will only receive participation ribbons.
- Exhibitors are permitted to show their under/ overweight animals in Showmanship Classes.
- 3. Fairground Presence & Removal:
- Exhibitors participating in the Under/Overweight and/or Showmanship classes will remain on the fairgrounds for the duration of the fair and follow designated release times.
- Exhibitors choosing not to participate in their respective show and/or Showmanship must remove their animal immediately from the fairgrounds after weigh-in.

No personal scales permitted on the fairgrounds at any time - if caught on grounds (including on trailers) exhibitors and projects will be immediately disqualified and sent home.

FOR ALL JUNIOR FAIR MEMBERS EXHIBITORS

- 1. All Junior Fair livestock may also be entered in their respective open classes, if applicable. Open class entry form, must be sent to Becky Selmon, Belmont County Agricultural Society 45420 Roscoe Road, St Clairsville, OH 43950 – Secretary of the Senior Fair Board. Regular entry fees will be charged and forms submitted by deadline each year.
- 2. All Junior Fair livestock must be registered at Livestock Skillathon.The registration forms will be available the day of Junior Fair Livestock Skillathon and are DUE by Make-Up judging on August 18, 2025, and forms must be turned in that day NO later than 4:30 p.m. All forms are available from the Belmont County Extension Office.
- 3. Regularly enrolled members of Belmont Co. 4-H clubs, organized and conducted under the supervision of the Ohio State University Extension and Belmont Co. FFA members are eligible to exhibit in this department. A member must not have passed his/her 19th birthday on January 1, of the current year to be eligible.

- 4. All Junior Fair Animals must be in place by 4 p.m. on Mon., Sept. 1, 2025. If they are not in place (in the barn and in their assigned pen/stall) by deadline, the exhibitor will forfeit all eligibility to show at the current fair and will be sent home. In case of an emergency (flat-tire, accident, etc.) call the Senior Fair Board Office at 740-695-5059 or 740-312-0842 to advise the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent. Situations will be reviewed by the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent for approval.
- 5. All animals must be shown by owner unless WRITTEN permission is given by the Jr. Fair Coordinators, for another Belmont Co. Junior Fair member to show animals. Except in the case where a member has two or more animals in the same class (excluding showmanship), then another Belmont Co. Junior Fair members may show the second animal without written permission.
- 6. NO assistance from adults, except in emergencies. This also applies to showmanship classes. Each exhibitor is encouraged to fit their own animal.
- 7. All exhibitors must follow arrival and release times as outlined in the fair schedule as it pertains to tack and livestock. Any animal(s) leaving the fairgrounds outside of normal release time must have written permission (via receipt) from Josh Lude, Amber Cawthorne, or Greg Mehlman.
- 8. Junior Fair stall assignments are assigned by Junior Fair adult department advisors. Failure to house your animal(s) in assigned space, will result in forfeit of premiums. NO stalls are to be switched unless approved and done by the Jr. Fair Board Coordinator(s) and Barn Superintendent.
- 9. Market animals are to remain in the care of the Exhibitor until it is removed from the Fairgrounds. All premiums will be forfeited for failure to feed and water animals daily. In extreme cases, Exhibitors may be banned from exhibiting the following year at the Belmont County Fair.
- 10. All Junior Fair livestock exhibitors are to clean stalls/ pens daily. Exhibitors must clean stalls/pens to the ground and have their stall checked by a Junior Fair Board Director or Advisor, from their barn, before leaving the Fairgrounds. Failure to clean stalls/ pens will result in forfeiture of Junior Fair livestock premiums. All exhibitors must have all livestock removed and stalls cleaned by 6:30 p.m. on Sunday.
- 11. All animals taken to the fair must be entered in a class. Animals shown in a market class cannot be shown in a breeding class. Only livestock entered in a bonafide market class will be eligible for sale.
- 12. Exhibitors may show the same species in more than one junior fair organization. They cannot show the same project or animal more than once.
- 13. All first place winners in all livestock classes, except horses, are to compete for Champion or Grand Champion. Remaining first place winners plus second place winners of class producing a Champion are to compete for Reserve Champion or Reserve Grand Champion.

- 14. All Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hogs, steers, lambs, and goats must be urine tested and go directly to a state inspected slaughter house or to the sale barn and then directly to a state inspected slaughter house. Any failed drug test will result in forfeiture of awards and premiums of the current year and eligibility to exhibit at the next Belmont County Fair. The animal must leave the grounds immediately.
- 15. All Junior Fair Beef and Dairy Cattle must be secured with a neck rope. Failure to comply with this rule will mean the animal must be removed immediately from the fairgrounds.
- 16. All Breeding, Market, and Showmanship Classes will have no more than ten animals in a class. Steers will have no more than five animals in a class.
- 17. It is recommended that all Junior Fair exhibitors be dressed in appropriate attire and be neat and clean in appearance. No advertisement of any kind will be allowed in the show ring.
- 18. NO STRAW WILL BE FURNISHED FOR THE FAIR YOU MUST FURNISH YOUR OWN BEDDING.
- 19. Animals to be replaced (sick or die):
- a. Veterinarian's statement must be given in case of sickness or death of an animal for replacement.
- b. The Livestock Superintendent must give approval before animals can be replaced and be provided with veterinarian's statement.
- c. No replacement will be given after the following dates: * April 4, 2025 – Steers * July 3, 2025 – Lambs, Goats, and Hogs * August 1, 2025 - Feeder Calves * August 9, 2025 – Rabbits * Five days after hatch date - Poultry * August 18, 2025 - Horses (must be replaced by registered replacement horse) *
- d. Animals can be replaced by another animal that has previously been weighed in, tagged, registered and owned by a sibling or registered as a family animal.
- 20. Family Animals:

Each Junior Fair exhibitor must register at least one animal/pen of animals in his/her Name first before registering a family animal. A family may register an additional two animals of each species as designated family animals. The maximum amount of registered animals/pens per exhibitor is four, including the two family animals. State fair livestock entries may not be registered as family animals. Family animals are only utilized by a household. See definition of household section 901-19-01 of the Ohio Livestock Tampering Exhibition Rules.

HOW TO USE FAMILY ANIMALS:

- 1. Include family animal on registration for all exhibitors who may end up showing the animal. Ensure that the "Family Animal" checkbox is clearly marked for that animal.
- Complete all required steps for that animal as if it was registered to an individual exhibitor – i.e. tag in, photo verification, entry, etc.
- 3. Include family animal on entry forms for any junior fair exhibitor who may end up showing the animal.
- 4. Exhibitors must choose which animal(s) to exhibit at the time of weigh-in during the fair. Only two animals per species are permitted for each exhibitor.

SHOWMANSHIP

- All exhibitors should compete in showmanship classes according to their age as of January 1 of the current year.
- a. Senior Showmanship 16-18 years
- **Senior Showmanship winner will compete for Master Showman.
- b. Intermediate Showmanship 12-15 years
- ** Intermediate Showmanship winner will compete for Master Showman.
- c. Junior Showmanship -8-11 years
- ** Junior Showmanship winner will compete for Master Showman.
- d. Master Showman The first-place winners from Junior, Intermediate, and Senior showmanship classes of the current year will compete for the Master Showman.

Members can show another person's animal in showmanship classes with the consent of the owner if there are unforeseen circumstances such as sickness of the animal resulting in the animal being sent home, etc., and fair entry forms have been submitted to the Extension Office by the entry form deadline date. (This rule does not pertain to horses).

Once an exhibitor enters a class with an animal for showmanship, he/she may not switch animals for the class.

The first-place winners from Junior, Intermediate, and Senior showmanship classes of the current year will compete for the Master Showman. The winner of the Master Showmanship classes will be the Top Showman of the species. Once the Master Showman is selected, the showman who placed 2nd to that showman will enter the ring. This process will continue until the Top 5 Showmen of the species have been selected. Only showmen who placed 1st, 2nd, or 3rd within their respective age divisions from Junior, Intermediate, and Senior showmanship categories will be eligible to participate in the Top 5 Showmen selection. This is the order of showmen that will be used to determine eligibility for the Showman of Showmen contest. Only the Master Showmanship winner will receive an award.

SHOWMAN OF SHOWMEN CONTEST RULES/PROCEDURES

- 1. Open to Master Showmanship winners of the current year. In the event that the Master Showman of a species is ineligible or unable to participate the opportunity will be given to the next highest placed Master of Showmanship participant that is eligible and willing.
- 2. Participants will show in class for each species except the species in which he/she is Master Showman. Species to participate will be: Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horse, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, and Rabbit.
- 3. Master Showman from each species will be responsible for obtaining enough animals and equipment to show that species, to form a class of seven. Each Master Showman is responsible for having people available to assist in getting animals into the show ring on schedule.

- 4. The Master Showman of each species will serve as the judges. At completion of each class the Master Showman will give comments on the correct way to show the species.
- 5. Each class will have 10 minutes to show.
- 6. Participants should dress according to the dress code for species of which he/she is Master Showman.
- 7. Order of show: Rabbits, Poultry, Beef, Dairy, Hogs, Sheep, Goats, then Horses
- 8. Participants will be placed from 1st 7th with points scored equal to placing.
- 9. Scores will be kept confidential.
- 10. The participant with the lowest score will be the Showman of Showmen.
- 11. Any disputes regarding this contest will be resolved by a committee of adults representing Jr. Fair Board, Sr. Fair Board, and the Showman of Showmen Committee Advisor. The protest procedure as listed under Junior Fair Rules, including the \$100 deposit will be followed.
- 12. If a person wins the Showman of Showmen Contest once, they cannot participate in the contest again.
- 13. After winning Master Showmanship and/or given the envelope/packet to participate in the Showman of Showmen Contest, the exhibitor has 24 HOURS with the exception of horse and dairy being due 1 hour after hand delivery to exhibitor/family to return the envelope/packet to the Junior Fair Office. If outside of the timeframe for ANY REASON, the exhibitor automatically forfeits their eligibility for that species. NO EXCEPTIONS!!! The opportunity will automatically be given to the next highest placed Master Showmanship participant for that specific species.
- 14. If an exhibitor wins Master Showmanship and/or receives the Showman of Showmen envelope/packet for more than one species, they are still required to turn in the packet/envelope within the 24- hour timeframe. The exhibitor will be able to choose the species they would like to represent. The open/ vacant species envelope/ packet at this point, will be passed down to the next highest placed Master Showmanship participant.

- 2. SELF-TAGGING PHOTO VERIFICATION: To verify that self-tagging was completed, a photo verification must be sent into the Belmont County OSU Extension Office for review. Photos can be emailed to Belmontcojfb@gmail.com or brought into the Extension Office during business hours, and MUST include a photo in which the animal, member, and tag number in the animal's ear are clearly visible. These photos are due by December 2nd at 4:30 p.m. Failure to submit photo verification will result in ineligibility to show at the 2025 Belmont County Fair.
- 3. Only steers showing predominance of recognized beef breeds or dairy steers of Holstein, Brown Swiss or their crosses may be entered.
- 4. All steers must be separated from nurse cows and fed no milk after the tag-in in November.
- 5. Steers must be castrated and dehorned on or before November 16, 2024. The official fair veterinarian will have the final decision on what are horns and what are scurs, and what stays on the fairgrounds and what is to be taken back home.
- 6. Four steers is the maximum each exhibitor may tag-in. Exhibitors may only show up to two steers.
- 7. Exhibitors may sell only one steer at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.

Feeder Calves must be owned and in the continual care of the member by tag pick-up. Late registrations are not permitted and will prevent Jr. Fair members from exhibiting and selling at the Belmont County Fair.
- 3. SELF-TAGGING PHOTO VERIFICATION: To verify that self-tagging was completed, a photo verification must be sent into the Belmont County OSU Extension Office for review. Photos can be emailed to Belmontcojfb@gmail.com or brought into the Extension Office during business hours, and MUST include a photo in which the animal, member, and tag number in the animal's ear are clearly visible. - 7. Feeder calves must be castrated, dehorned and healed by fair time. The official fair veterinarian will have the final decision on what are horns and what are scurs, and what stays on the fairgrounds and what is to be taken back home.
- 8. Only steers and heifers will be permitted to show.

ALL goats must be Scrapie tagged by June 7, 2025. Participants must be able to provide documentation during the fair that includes the animal's official Scrapie ID and the name and address of the flock where the animal was born and where/when it was sold per USDA guidelines. Noncompliance with this requirement could result in the animal being removed from the grounds per USDA guidelines.

MARKET GOAT RULES

- 1. Market goats should be born on or after January 1, 2025 and on or before April 30, 2025.
- Goats must be owned and in possession of the exhibitor by the Jr. Fair tag pickup day of June 7, 2025. A maximum of four goats, per exhibitor, may be taggedin, from which a maximum of two goats may be shown at the fair.
- 3. Market Goats must be castrated by June 7, 2025. Market goats have the option to have horns or be dehorned.
- 4. All Market Goat project registration forms must be turned in the Jr. Fair tag pickup on June 7, 2025 at the Belmont County Fairgrounds. The Junior Fair member's records must include the animal's official Scrapie ID and the name and address of the flock where the animal was born and where and when it was sold per USDA guidelines. Late registrations are not permitted and will prevent Jr. Fair members from exhibiting and selling at the Belmont County Fair.
- 5. SELF-TAGGING PHOTO VERIFICATION: To verify that self-tagging was completed, a photo verification must be sent into the Belmont County OSU Extension Office for review. Photos can be emailed to Belmontcojfb@gmail.com or brought into the Extension Office during business hours, and MUST include a photo in which the animal, member, and tag number in the animal's ear are clearly visible. These photos are due by June 20th at 4:30 p.m. Failure to submit photo verification will result in ineligibility to show at the Belmont County Fair.

DAIRY GOAT RULES

- 1. Dairy goats must be owned and in the possession of the exhibitor by June 1 of the current year.

- 4. The entire pen must be lined with small enough wire so goats cannot get their heads through (ie: chicken wire). Exhibitors must provide, install, and tear down wire.

RULES

- 1. All Junior Fair Horse Projects must be in place by 4pm, Monday, September 1, 2025
- 2. The Jr. Fair Horse Show will be judged using the State 4-H Uniform Rules for Horse Shows available by the OSU Extension Office. (Copies can be obtained at the OSU Extension Office)
- 3. It is MANDATORY to participate in 3 approved clinics or ride nights provided by the Jr Fair Advisors and/ or the 4-H Horse Committee members with their project horse prior to the Jr Fair. The Horse Kick-Off Clinic only counts as 1 clinic/ride night. If an exhibitor RIDES in the Belmont County PAS show, whether they qualify for state or not, that show will count toward their ride nights. If the same exhibitor qualifies for the Ohio State Fair Jr. Horse Show and RIDES for the events, that show will also count toward their ride nights. IT IS MANDATORY THAT ALL HORSE EXHIBITORS ATTEND ONE OF THE TWO RIDE NIGHTS IN AUGUST OF EACH YEAR TO BE ELIGIBLE TO SHOW AT THE UPCOMING FAIR.
- 4. Encouragement Sessions are mandatory for the 1st and 2nd year exhibitors. They will meet with the Horse Jr Fair board Advisors at an agreeable time on either Monday or Tuesday before 7pm week of the Jr. Fair.
- 5. Encouragement Classes for the 1st and 2nd year exhibitors will be evaluated on project book knowledge. Each participating member will show a simple Showmanship pattern. The exhibitor and exhibiting horse's appearance, grooming, and general health of the animal will also be considered. Encouragement Class exhibitor's will be graded, but no placings given. A grade ribbon will be awarded at the time of show. Horses will not be lined up head to tail for safety reasons.
- All exhibitors must register to the OSU Extension Office their project horse(s) and back up horse by May 1st of the fair year. The back-up horse may not be replaced.

- 7. Each horse participant may register a maximum of two horses per division to the extension office by May 1st -- ONLY ONE HORSE PER DIVISION MAY BE EXHIBITED AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR. With the exception of the Draft Horse and Small Equine, who may register and participate at Jr. Fair with a maximum of two horses in that division (example: Draft Horse Team of two). Should a decision need to be made concerning stabling of an extra project horse, the Livestock Superintendent and Jr Fair Horse Department Advisors will decide.
- 8. Lease projects must follow regulations outlined in the State 4-H lease contract. Completed lease information is due to the OSU Extension Office by May 1st of the current year.
- 9. All equine must be under restraint of its exhibitor or exhibitor's parent, guardian, or advisor always while outside of stall. No horse shall be loose unless contained in its assigned stall.
- 10. Cell Phones or other distracting devices SHOULD NOT be in hand while handling the equine.
- 11. Paddock area is reserved for the exhibitor, exhibitor's animal, guardian, fair directors and advisors.



ARENA RULES

- 1. ELIGIBILITY to ride during the Belmont County Fair on the fairgrounds.
- a. Must be enrolled in a 4-H/FFA Equine Project.
- b. Must be showing an Equine Project at the Fair.
- c. Member and Parent must have completed Equi-Step.
- d. Must wear a properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM/SEI standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while working, riding, or driving an equine.
- 2. SUPERVISION All Jr Fair exhibitors regardless of age or skill level must have a parent, guardian, 4-H/FFA advisor, or Sr Fair Director supervising.
- 3. RIDING HOURS are from 6 am to 10:45 pm. HORSES MUST BE IN THE BARN BY 11 P.M. On show days it is permissible to start warm-up/ exercising their horse at 5am.
- a. Ride time allotment sheets for sign-ups will be posted in the Horse Office during the fair.
- b. Lights in the arena must be on after dusk.
- c. At the time in which the arena is being watered down due to dry weather, no exhibitors or animals will be permitted in the riding arena.
- d. No 4-H/FFA, family, and/or friends will be permitted in the riding arena or to ride an exhibitor's horse at any time while on the fairgrounds. There is to be no one other than the exhibitor to ride a horse being exhibited at the county fair 30 days prior to the start of the fair until they leave the grounds at the conclusion of the fair.
- e. All horses must be ridden with a legal bridle, bosal, or hackamore.

NPIP HATCH PAPERS & PULLORUM TESTING

- 1. All Market Chickens, Market Ducks, Market Geese and Market Turkeys must be bought directly from a flock or hatchery that is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP).
- 2. NPIP paperwork must be submitted for review. Photos can be emailed to Belmontcojfb@gmail. com or brought into the Extension Office during business hours. These photos are due by August 1st at 4:30 p.m. If no NPIP paperwork is submitted you are required to attend Pullorum testing on August 9th, 10am - 12pm. Failure to do either will result in ineligibility to show at the Belmont County Fair. Waterfowl are exempt from pullorum testing.
- Market Turkeys will be blood tested by the Fair Veterinarian at the exhibitors expense if NPIP paperwork is not submitted.
- 4. Exhibition, Fancy, Production and Egg Laying Poultry may still be subject to pullorum testing if the animal did not come directly from a flock or hatchery that is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) within the current year.

EXHIBITION, FANCY, PRODUCTION AND EGG LAYING POULTRY

- 1. All exhibitors must own and have their poultry projects in their possession by June 1 of the current year.
- Exhibit Entry Limits: Egg Production exhibit one bird; Exotic Fancy Bird - up to two birds per breed; Breeding Ducks - up to two birds per breed; Geese up to two birds per breed; Breeding Turkey - exhibit one bird.

MARKET BROILER RULES

- 1. Broilers must be between 6 and 8 weeks of age by fair.
- 2. Market Broiler pens must consist of three chickens of the same meat breed type. Two pens of three are permitted to be exhibited and sold by each exhibitor.
- 3. All exhibitors must purchase their broilers through private means. Broilers should be in the possession of the exhibitor by July 22, 2025.

- 4. Minimum weight of Market Broilers is 6 pounds per bird and the maximum weight is 8 pounds. If one bird in the pen does not meet weight requirements, the pen is disqualified from selling in the Livestock Sale but may show in the underweight or overweight class and showmanship. Broilers in a pen should weigh as close to the same weight as possible. If one or more market broilers shall die or become ill/sent home after a successful weigh-in, the exhibitor will show and sell the remaining birds in the pen. If all three birds are sent home or die, the exhibitor will NOT show and sell the pen.
- 5. All market broilers must receive a leg band after a successful weigh in at the fair. The leg bands will be placed on each bird by a Senior Fair Board Director at weigh-in during the fair.

MARKET TURKEY RULES

- 1. All exhibitors must purchase their Market Turkey's by private means and in possession of the exhibitor by June 1st of the current year. Market turkeys must be hatched between the fourth week of March and the fourth week of April each year.
- 2. Market Turkeys must weigh between 25-50 pounds. If the turkey does not meet weight requirements, the turkey is disqualified from selling in the Livestock Sale but may show in the underweight or overweight class and showmanship. Two market turkeys are permitted to be exhibited and sold by each exhibitor.
- 3. All market turkeys must receive a leg band after a successful weigh-in at the fair. The leg bands will be placed on each bird by a Senior Fair Board Director at weigh-in during the fair.

MARKET DUCK RULES

- 1. Market ducks should be between 6 and 8 weeks of age by fair time.
- Market ducks must consist of two ducks of the same meat breed type. Two pens of market ducks are permitted to be exhibited and sold by each exhibitor.
- 3. All exhibitors must purchase their ducks through Private means. Market ducks should be in the possession of the exhibitor by July 22, 2025.
- 4. Market Ducks must weigh 5 -10 pounds per bird. If one duck in the pen does not meet weight requirements,

the pen is disqualified from selling in the Livestock Sale but may show in the underweight or overweight class and showmanship. Market ducks in a pen should weigh as close to the same weight as possible.If one market duck shall die or become ill/ sent home after a successful weigh-in, the exhibitor will show and sell the remaining duck. If the second duck dies or becomes ill/sent home, the exhibitor will NOT show and sell the pen.

5. All market ducks must receive a leg band after a successful weigh-in at the fair. The leg bands will be placed on each duck by a Senior Fair Board Director at weigh-in during the fair.

MARKET GEESE RULES

- 1. Market Geese should be between 10 and 13 weeks of age by fair time.
- 2. Market Geese must consist of two geese of the same meat breed type.Two pens of market geese are permitted to be exhibited and sold by each exhibitor.
- 3. All exhibitors must purchase their geese through Private means. Market geese should be in the possession of the exhibitor by June 1, 2025.
- 4. Market Geese must weigh 9-14 pounds per bird. If one goose in the pen does not meet weight requirements, the pen is disqualified from selling in the Livestock Sale but may show in the underweight or overweight class and showmanship. Market Geese in a pen should weigh as close to the same weight as possible. If one market goose shall die or become ill/ sent home after a successful weigh-in, the exhibitor will show and sell the remaining goose. If the second goose dies or becomes ill/sent home, the exhibitor will NOT show and sell the pen.
- 5. All market geese must receive a leg band after a successful weigh-in at the fair. The leg bands will be placed on each goose by a Senior Fair Board Director at weigh-in during the fair.

RABBIT PREMIUMS

BREEDING RABBIT CLASSES

Breeding rabbit classes are separated by breed and sex.

BREEDING RABBIT RULES

- 1. Rabbits must be owned and in the possession of the exhibitor by June 1, 2025.
- 2. Rabbit Roundup: All rabbits must attend rabbit roundup on Saturday, August 9, 8am-10am. Rabbits will be checked for illness, accurate sex, breed, and may be tattooed for identification if the exhibitor so chooses.
- 3. Exhibitors may show no more than two animals in a class. Exhibitors may show no more than eight lots in a show (A lot being one breeding rabbit or one pen of three), ie. Six breeding animals and 2 pens of three, or eight breeding animals is the maximum.

MEAT PEN OF THREE RABBITS

- 1. Rabbit exhibitors may purchase rabbits for their market pen of three. Alternatively, breeding is still allowed, meaning exhibitors can raise their own market rabbits. Market rabbits are required to be kindled between June 23, 2025 and June 29, 2025 and in the possession of the exhibitor by August 1 of the current year.
- 2. Meat pens consist of three rabbits from the same litter and must be of a meat breed. Two pens of three are permitted to be exhibited and sold by each exhibitor.
- 3. Rabbit Roundup: All rabbits must attend rabbit roundup on Saturday August 9, 8am-10am. Rabbits will be checked for illness, accurate sex, breed, and to be tattooed for identification. Exhibitors may bring an additional three rabbits from the same litter to be checked in case of loss for each pen of three rabbits.
- 4. If one rabbit in the pen does not meet weight requirements, the pen is disqualified from selling in the Livestock Sale but may show in the underweight or overweight class and showmanship. Market rabbits in a pen should weigh as close to the same weight as possible. After a successful weigh-in, if any number of rabbits become sick or die, the exhibitor will show and sell the remaining animals in the pen. If all animals

become sick or die, the exhibitor WILL NOT be able to show and sell the pen.

5. Minimum weight of each rabbit is 3 pounds and maximum weight of each rabbit is 5 pounds.







SHEEP

SHEEP PREMIUMS

1st, \$4.00; 2nd, \$3.50; others \$3.00

ALL sheep must be Scrapie tagged by June 7, 2025. Participants must be able to provide documentation during the fair that includes the animal's official Scrapie ID and the name and address of the flock where the animal was born and where/when it was sold per USDA guidelines. Noncompliance with this requirement could result in the animal being removed from the grounds per USDA guidelines.

MARKET LAMB CLASSES

- 1. Light Weight (95-110 Pounds)
- 2. Medium Weight (111-130 Pounds)
- 3. Heavy Weight (131-150 Pounds)

MARKET LAMB RULES

- 1. Market lambs should be born on or after January 1, 2025 and on or before April 30, 2025.
- 2. Lambs must be owned by and in possession of the exhibitor by the Jr. Fair tag pickup day of June 7, 2025. A maximum of four lambs, per exhibitor, may be tagged-in, from which a maximum of two lambs may be shown at the fair.
- 3. Lambs must be dehorned and castrated before the June 7, 2025, tag pickup. The official fair veterinarian will have the final decision on what are horns and what are scurs, and what stays on the fairgrounds and what is to be taken back home.
- 4. All Market Lamb project registration forms must be turned in at the Jr. Fair tag pickup on June 7, 2025 at the Belmont County Fairgrounds. The Junior Fair member's records must include the animal's official Scrapie ID and the name and address of the flock where the animal was born and where and when it was sold per USDA guidelines. Late registrations are not permitted and will prevent Jr. Fair members from exhibiting and selling at the Belmont County Fair.

- 5. SELF-TAGGING PHOTO VERIFICATION: To verify that
 - self-tagging was completed, a photo verification must be sent into the Belmont County OSU Extension Office for review. Photos can be emailed to Belmontcojfb@ gmail.com or brought into the Extension Office during business hours, and MUST include a photo in which the animal, member, and tag number in the animal's ear are clearly visible. These photos are due by June 20th at 4:30 p.m. Failure to submit photo verification will result in ineligibility to show at the Belmont County Fair.
- 6. It is mandatory that Junior Fair Market Lamb projects be shorn prior to the animal's arrival at the fair.

SHEEP BREEDING CLASSES

- 1. Ram, 2 Years Old and Over (born prior to 8/31/23)
- 2. Ram, 1 Year Old to 2 Years Old (9/1/23 to 8/31/24)

- 1. All breeding projects must be owned or leased and in possession of the exhibitor by June 1, 2025.

- 3. All male market hogs must be castrated and healed prior to June 7, 2025.
- 4. All Market Hog project registration forms must be turned in the Jr. Fair tag pickup on June 7, 2025 at the Belmont County Fairgrounds. Late registrations are not permitted and will prevent Jr. Fair members from exhibiting and selling at the Belmont County Fair.



- 5. Exhibits must remain complete until 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 7, 2025. Booth teardown will be from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 7, 2025. All booths must be removed by 7:00 p.m., Sunday. No project may be removed before release times listed. Violation will result in forfeit of club booth premium, and the individual forfeits his/her project premium and exclusion from exhibiting in the Junior Fair for the following year.
- 6. Booths are supplied by the Belmont County Junior Fair Board. White paper will be available for group use; however, any color or type of material may be used. All other supplies and equipment needed for completing the displays must be furnished by the individual groups.
- 7. Exhibits should not extend above the structure of the booth.
- 8. No paint is to be used on any part of the booth structure.

- 9. The use of electricity is strictly forbidden.
- 10. Nonperishable foods can be used on display. Use models or pictures. Models may not have real icing.
- 11. DO NOT USE NAILS OR SCREWS OR GLUE IN BOOTHS. Use tape, thumb tacks or staples. These must be removed when the exhibits are taken down at the end of the fair. Clean up and remove all materials. Clubs must remove all paper, take out staples, thumb tacks, etc. All paper and trash should be deposited in cans outside doors and areas in front of booths swept. The Building Supervisor MUST CHECK YOUR BOOTH BEFORE YOU LEAVE. Booth Premiums will be forfeited if clean-up is not done correctly. All booths must be checked and approved for premiums to be awarded.
- 12. If room permits, space will be provided for oversized projects that do not fit into individual club booth exhibits.
- 13. Group names must be prominently displayed within the booth.
- 14. Any group that uses a copyrighted idea, i.e. Garfield, Pepsi, etc. must have written permission from the company.

All exhibiting booths will be given an equal premium, to be determined. Girl Scout judging will include 1st, 2nd and 3rd place ribbons for booth displays for 2025. Premiums to be determined.

FAIR PROJECT RULES AND GUIDELINES

- Girl Scouts consider participating in the Belmont County Fair a privilege and an opportunity to share interests, accomplishments and ideals. All entries must exhibit high quality in effort, originality and neatness. Entries should reflect, overall, the Girl Scout program and its ideals. Each girl's entry will be judged on its own merits and not against other entries. The age or program level of the Girl Scout and the degree of difficulty and skill will be noted.
- 2. Fair entries should be an outgrowth of a good Girl Scout program in a troop or camp or showcasing the progress of each individual girl in pursuit of a hobby or interest. Projects must be made during the current registration year to be entered and must not have been entered in any previous Belmont County Fair.
- 3. Judging ribbons will be awarded to each entry brought to judging according to degree of excellence: First Class -Excellent; Second Class- Well Done; Third Class - Good. The criteria will be "Is this an average, good or excellent job of workmanship and creativity? Does it reflect the Girl Scout Program? How much did the girl learn or grow in doing her project?" A Girl Scout's satisfaction will be in knowing she did her very best.
- 4. All entries, including booth entries, must be in place by 12 noon on Monday, September 1, 2025, to be considered for a judging ribbon or booth award. All entries must be preregistered prior to the deadline (August 1 of the current year). Items or booths displayed in Junior Fair brought after judging date and time will receive participation ribbons only.
- Each exhibitor is permitted to enter more than one project; however, only one judging ribbon will be awarded per exhibitor.
- 6. Group projects, entered in the fair by at least 3 girls working together in the same program level, will be considered, and judged separately from individual projects, with a judging ribbon being awarded to the project and not to each individual working on that project. Scrapbooks or posters put together by adults are not eligible.

- 7. All entries, including group projects, must have 3X5" entry judging cards attached to qualify for judging. The cards must contain the following information: Name(s), Troop Number, Level, Age(s), Project Name, Leader Name. Without this card attached, the entry will not be judged. Cards will be distributed to troop leaders by the Girl Scout Advisor to the Junior Fair once registration information is received.
- 8. Exhibits are always under the supervision of competent persons and every effort will be made to protect them from loss or damage. However, neither the management of the Belmont County Fair nor Girl Scouts U.S.A., will be responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
- 9. Special Instructions:
- ART ENTRIES- All painting, drawing, photographs, poetry, etc., must be of the original work of the girl submitting it. Murals that can be rolled will be exhibited only if space permits. All artwork, wall hangings and photography are to be matted or framed in some suitable form for exhibit, and ready to hang with wires, cords, etc., securely attached.
- COOKING ENTRIES- All exhibits must have recipes attached (ingredients and directions). Cakes and breads must be entered in whole and will be cut for judging. Cookies, candy, or cupcakes must have at least 6 pieces submitted for judging. For displaying at the fair, items must have a replica or picture of the judged item on a paper plate with a recipe attached. Nonperishable food can be used on display.
- SEWING OR WEARABLE CRAFT ENTRIES- All articles of wearing apparel, including jewelry or hair ornaments, must have a snapshot attached showing the article worn or modeled.
- POSTER ENTRIES- All poster exhibits may be no larger than 22"X 28".

Booth exhibits will be judged according to the following point system:

SCORE CARD

- 1. General Appearance: well balanced, attracts attention, presents idea clearly, neatness (40 Points)
- 2. Material: quality of exhibit, attractive display of organization name (30 Points)
- 3. Effectiveness: presents original/unusual/striking ideas relating to displayed work, development of selected theme (30 Points)

- 4. Royalty to meet with the Junior Fair Advisor following the crowning to review fair responsibilities. Refer to the Junior Fair Royalty Application for the complete and up-to-date list of Expectations of Junior Fair Royalty during the Fair.
- 5. All candidates selected for Junior Fair Royalty Court must participate in Royalty Orientation on Thurs., August 28, 2025 at 4:30 p.m at the Extension Office.

LIVESTOCK SALE COMMITTEE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

CONSTITUTION

- Article I The name of the organization shall be called "Belmont County Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee".
- Article II The major purpose of the committee is to work with the Extension Educators and representatives of other youth organizations in helping to determine need and direction of the Junior Fair Livestock Sale by:
- 1. Assisting with planning, evaluating, recommending and carrying out activities as they relate to the Junior Fair Sale.
- 2. Seeking local financial resources and support, as needed, to conduct, promote and expand the Junior Fair Sale.
- Article III Officers of the committee shall be president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. The committee will meet in March, June, August and October.

BY-LAWS

- Article I Two advisors and two members will represent each club participating in market livestock projects and will be elected by their club.
- Article II The officers of the committee shall be elected at the March meeting each year and shall be called the "Executive Committee".

- Article III The duties of the officers shall be: The PRESIDENT shall preside at all meetings of the committee and always have in mind the best interest of the committee; the VICE PRESIDENT shall perform the duties of the president in his absence: the SECRETARY shall keep a record of all proceedings of the committee and shall act as correspondent in matters pertaining to the business of the committee and the TREASURER shall receive and take care of all monies belonging to the committee and shall pay out upon order of the president and secretary and shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and expenditures.
- Article IV Committees for special purposes may be appointed by the President at any time.
- Article V The Executive Committee, under the advisement of the Extension Educators shall have decision making authority during the fair in regards to the Junior Fair Sale.
- Article VI Majority vote shall constitute an election.
- Article VII This constitution may be altered at any regular meeting of the Committee when due notice of such alteration or amendment shall have been given at a regular meeting preceding and passed by a twothirds vote of the members present.

RULES

- The Junior Fair Livestock Sale's Order of Sale will alternate annually with each species being sold in rotation within their time frame,1:00 p.m. or 5 p.m. (With these exceptions: Feeder Calves; Beef Feeder Calves and Dairy Feeder Calves will alternate in sale order each year among themselves, which will always follow Steers; Turkeys, Broilers and Ducks will alternate in sale order each year among themselves. Any species goes to the bottom of rotation after being at the top.
- 2. Junior Fair show rules must have been followed. All animals that will be sold at the Junior Fair Sale must be registered by the end of the Beef Show on Wednesday, September 3, 2025. This information must be given to the Junior Fair Office during the hours the office is open.
- 3. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Rabbit, Broilers, Ducks, Turkey, Hog, Goat, Steer, and Lamb animals must be sold in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. All Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hogs, market steers, market lambs and market goats must go directly to a state inspected slaughter house or to the sale barn and then directly to a state inspected slaughter house.
- 4. Junior Fair members may sell no more than two lots per person. The only exception is if an exhibitor has more than 2 Overall Grand or Reserve Grand Champion Animals.
- 5. No animal or lot allowed in the sale ring more than once.

STEERS

Exhibitors may sell only one steer at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitors will make a decision on which animal to sell, if two animals were shown, immediately following the Steer Show. No changes may be made after giving Junior Fair Office your decision on which animal to sell. Each market beef animal is to be sold individually. Only steers between 1,000-1,500 may sell.

FEEDER CALVES

Exhibitors may sell only one feeder calf at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitors will make a decision on which animal to sell; if two animals were shown. No changes may be made after giving the Junior Fair Office your decision on which animal to sell. Only feeder calves between 300-750 may sell.

HOGS

Only Market Hogs between 220 – 300 pounds may sell.

GOATS

Only Market Goats between 60-120 pounds may sell.

LAMBS

Only Market Lambs weighing between 95-150 pounds may sell.

RABBITS

(Pen of Three Fryers) Market Broiler Pens must consist of three chickens of the same breed type.Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell with all other pens of Three Market Fryers. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens between 9-15 pounds may sell.

BROILERS

(Pen of Three) Market Broiler Pens must consist of three chickens of the same breed type. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion pens must sell with other pens of Three Market Broilers. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens weighing between 18-24 pounds may sell.

DUCKS

(Pen of Two) Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell with all other pens of Two Market Ducks. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens between 10-20 may sell.

TURKEYS

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell with all other Market Turkeys. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only Market Turkeys between 25-50 pounds may sell.

GEESE

(Pen of Two) Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell with all other pens of Two Market Geese. Buyers must make arrangement with youth on fair departure. Only market pens between 18-24 may sell.

2025 EVENT RULES AND REGULATIONS

FULL SIZE STOCK RULES

- **BODY:** **Driver's and passenger door may be plated and welded for driver's safety. All other doors may use 4*' x 4** x ¹⁄₄ " plates weld 2 per seam only. All plates must be below top of door. Doors, trunk lids, and hood must be wired, banded, or chained shut. HOOD MUST BE OPEN FOR INSPECTION!
- **HOOD:** Trunk or tailgate may be wired or banded in 8 spots, (6 to the frame 2 must go from sheet metal to bumpers). Trunk may be bent down within 6 inches of the trunk floor. Quarter panels must remain in the original position. Creasing is allowed, but no crimping. Must be factory height OR **Hoods may have 3" x ¼ " angle iron welded to hood and fenders bolted with ½ " bolts in 6 spots. You are permitted to weld trunks in & spots (6 trunk and 2 to bumper) with 4" x 4" x ½". Hoods will be open for inspection. **12" hole in trunk required
- **BUMPERS:** Rear bumper must be a stock bumper or removed. No wedge or pointy bumpers permitted. May be welded on factory brackets. Front bumper may be any stock OEM/SMW or replica bumper ¹/₄" thick. No homemade bumpers permitted. Ends of bumpers may be open or closed. Bumpers can be seam welded. Front bumper can be mounted with 6" long, 3" diameter, ¹/₄ " thick pipe or square tubing welded outside front frame rails or use factory mounting shocks.
- ** Fix-a-plates must be 4" from brackets or plates.
- **BODY MOUNTS:** All body mounts must remain stock. No adding body mounts.
- **DRIVETRAIN:** You may swap motor and transmission only. Motor mounts may be welded. No rear end swaps or suspension work. All factory rear end gears may be welded. No cradles, slider shafts, distributor protectors, or braces of any kind. No transmission braces.
- **SUSPENSION:** Must be all stock working suspension. To raise the front end, you may twist in spacers. For front coil springs and rear Chrysler products, you may raise the front with torsion bars.
- WHEELS/TIRES: You may run any tires on stock appearing rim. Must hold air nothing welded to outside of the rim. No bead lock rims.
- **BATTERY/GAS TANKS:** Must be in driver's compartment secured and covered.
- 4 POINT CAGE AND HALO BARS: Are permitted. Must be welded to sheet metal only.

- **GAS TANK PROTECTORS:** Are permitted 32" wide. Must be 6" from any sheet metal in front of speaker box and rear axle. **Tank protectors must be 32" x 32" outside and must be 16" high and 6" in front of rear shock towers. Tank protectors are not permitted to be welded or bolted to the floor.
- **FIX-A-PLATES:** You may have four 4" x 4" x 1/4 " plates to any pre-run or fresh car. Plates must be 4"" apart and 4" from bumper plates or brackets and must also be painted white. Fix-a-plate must be flat on frame. Do not use plate to create a gusset!

DO NOT WELD OR BOLT ANYTHING THAT IS NOT STATED ABOVE OR IT WILL NOT PASS!! NO IMPERIALS PERMITTED IN STOCK CLASS!!

WIRE COMPACT RULES

** Age 12-15 are considered youth. If the driver has turned 16 during the derby season, they must move up to compete in the adult class. **

- **BODY:** Must be 4 or 6 cylinder compact car. Rear wheel drive cars 109" wheelbase/front wheel drive cars 113" wheelbase center hub to center hub. Car must be completely stripped, no windshields. You may wire or band doors. **Driver's and passenger door may be plated and welded for driver's safety. All other doors may use 4" x 4" x 1/4 " plates weld 2 per seam only. All plates must be below top of door. All body panels factory position.
- **HOOD/TRUNK:** Hoods must be open during inspection. Must cut a 12" hole in the hood. **12" hole in trunk required. Hood and trunk area may only be banded or wired in 8 spots (6 to frame and 2 must go from sheet metal around front and rear bumpers). OR **Hoods may have 3" x ¼ " angle iron welded to hood and fenders bolted with ½" bolts in 6 spots. You are permitted to weld trunks in 8 spots (6 trunk and 2 to bumper) with 4" x 4'* x ¼ ". Hoods will be open for inspection.
- **ENGINE/TRANSMISSION:** Must be factory drivetrain. No engine cradles. Motor mounts may be welded. Headers are permitted. **Carb Conversions permitted.
- WHEELS/TIRES: No bead protectors, no valve stem protectors, no solid wheels, must be a stock rim. Skid steer or tractor tires are permitted. No solid tires.
- GAS TANK/BATTERY: Must move gas tank behind front seat. No plastic OEM tanks. Tank protectors must be 32" x 32" outside and must be 16" high and 6" in front of rear shock towers. Tank protectors are not permitted to be welded or bolted to the floor. Battery must be moved to the passenger floorboard secured and covered.
- **4 POINT CAGE AND HALO BAR:** Halo bar over roof permitted. Tubing or pipe not to exceed 3", 4-point cage is recommended. Rear window bar permitted from roof of halo bar to speaker deck not trunk lid (except station wagon or mini vans).
- **BUMPERS:** Rear bumper must be a stock bumper or removed. No wedge or pointy bumpers permitted. May be welded on factory brackets. Front bumper may be any stock OEM/SMW or replica bumper ¹/₄ "thick. No homemade bumpers permitted. Ends of bumpers may be open or closed. Bumpers can be seam welded. Front bumper can be mounted with 6" long, 3" diameter, ¹/₄ " thick

pipe or square tubing welded outside front frame rails or use factory mounting shocks.

** Fix-a-plates must be 4" from brackets or plates.

- **SUSPENSION:** Suspensions must stay stock, no aftermarket anything on suspension; must bounce.
- **FIX-A-PLATES:** You may have four 4" x 4" x ¼ " plates to any pre-run or fresh car. Plates must be 4" apart and 4" from bumper plates or brackets and must also be painted white. Fix-a-plate must be flat on frame. Do not use plate to create a gusset!

Aftermarket pedals and shifters are permitted, nothing else.

NO WELDING ON THE CAR ANYWHERE EXCEPT FOR WHAT IS STATED ABOVE.

RIDING MOWER/LAWN TRACTOR DERBY RULES

Check-in time will be 1 hour ahead of the car derby check in. \$25 dollar to run.

Run at your own risk. We are not responsible for any bodily injury or damages to mower; final decisions are made by officials. We are here to have fun. Must sign waiver form to run.

- 1. Driver CANNOT be impaired at check-in or anytime until after the race.
- 2. All drivers must wear a helmet, long sleeve shirt, long pants, and eye protection.
- 3. The lawn mower must have a factory frame, no homemade frames.
- 4. No pull start mowers are permitted.
- 5. Only front mounted motors are allowed. No rear engine mowers.
- 6. No zero turns allowed
- Engine bay area may be reinforced but must be contained inside the hood and maintain factory body lines. Original steering linkage maybe reinforced, but cannot be replaced fully.
- 8. Engine must be factory mower engine no larger than 24 hp.
- 9. Mower decks must be removed. All plastic and lights must be removed.
- 10. Spark plug and carburetor protectors are allowed. Do not get carried away, official's decision is final.
- 11. Homemade exhausts are allowed but must be pointed up or down.
- 12. Leg guards are mandatory and must be bolted or welded from rear fender to front of footrest or frame. Must not protect tires in any way. Welds must hold.
- 13. Any mower with unsafe leg guard or any guard that falls off during event will not be allowed to continue.
- 14. Shifter guard is recommended to protect your hand/arm if shifter is mounted on fender, hand throttle is allowed.
- 15. No grill guards on the front of mower.
- Hood must stay stock and intact with the exception of replacing plastic/fiberglass hoods with sheet metal hoods. Hoods must be bolted, 9 wired, or chained down.
- 17. Trans axles remain factory but reinforcing or welding of

spider gears is permitted.

- 18. Brakes must be in operation when pulling in for the heat race, must also have forward and reverse.
- 19. A rear bumper is allowed, but is not allowed to extend more than 4 inches out and must stay in between outside most part of the tires. Also: NO SPIKES, NO SHARPEDGES or ANY PROTRUSIONS ALLOWED. Bumper can be homemade with Hollow Square Tubing or Hollow Round Stock. No larger than 3 inches.
- 20. NO front bumpers. EVERYTHING MUST FIT UNDER THE HOOD... The front of the mower must be smooth finish for safety. Cage is allowed but must be under the stock hood. Cage material must be no bigger than 2x2in square or 2in round.
- 21. Mowers must use lawn mower type wheels and tires or size proportion it. No dual wheels, tire chains, or studded tires are permitted. Tractor tread and cut tires are permitted, but must be lawn mower type. AIR ONLY IN TIRES NO FOAM, FLUIDS, ETC.
- 22. Numbers are to be fully visible on the hood and visible from each side
- 23. A rolled-over driver is out of the heat. Also, if a driver touches the ground with a hand, foot or any part of their body, the driver is out. If you know you're about to roll someone backoff. You will only get 1 warning.
- 24. For safety. If a mower rolls-over, all drivers must stop and wait until the driver is up,okay, and off the track. Also giving us time to upright the mower.
- 25. Must run pump gas only. NO Alcohol or Diesel.
- 26. Gas tank must be fastened with cap on, if it comes loose or gas leaks you will be disqualified.
- Inappropriate language and gestures will NOT be tolerated. You will be told to leave. We are here to have fun.
- 28. Mowers must resemble a factory mower; no other modifications will be permitted other than what is stated in these rules.
- 29. Must be able to start on its own power without a jump box. Once you are inspected and a stick is put on your mower, mowers must be put in line for derby.
- 30. Must have 1 spot on hood in front of steering wheel to attach break off stick.
- No pushing off or kicking off opponent's tires allowed. If locked up with another, rocking of the mower is the only thing allowed.
- 32. You must make 1 hit every 60 seconds. NO sandbagging.
- If mower does not pass inspection, or participant refuses to fix something, you will be disqualified. Only one reinspection allowed.
- 34. All motion to be halted upon signal from referees in case fire, injury, and other emergencies.
- 35. Officials have final say, we reserve the right to check mower after the derby.
- 36. Protesting a mower is \$35 dollars. If mower passes a second time the money will go to the driver who passed, if mower does not pass then the money will go to the driver who protested.

- 37. Any deviation of these rules is left to the discretion of the Officials. Their decision is final.
- 38. Keep in mind when building your mower, safety first for you and the other mower drivers you will be hitting.

Drivers must be 14 or older, and under 18 has to have a parent sign a consent form at check-in. All drivers must complete registration and waiver forms at the time of registration.

GENERAL SAFETY RULES

Must have loops on all drive shafts and U-joint shields. 3 on rear and 2 on front. A working kill switch. Kill switch must be accessible to the sled in plain view of sight. Kill switch must shut off the fuel pump. Must Have neutral safety "white" light visible by the sled operator. Must have a fire extinguisher within hand reach. Blow proof bell housing or blanket and flywheel shields are insurance required. Must wear a helmet. No hot rodding in the pit area. Driver use of a race seat with five-point harness recommended. Fire proof clothing (gloves, shoes, jacket, pants) recommended.

8500-POUND OPEN DIESEL TRUCKS

- **ENGINE:** Motor changes that increase horsepower over and above the factory rated horsepower or that increase RPMs over and above factory rated range will be limited to changing of chips, air intake system (K&N and other) and exhaust systems. Must run OEM cylinder head and OEM blocks. No aftermarket permitted. The use of two (2) high pressure common rail fuel pumps is legal. The use of only one (1) P pump to P7100 allowed. 13MM plunger limit. Ag governors are permitted. Pump diesel is the only fuel permitted. Absolutely no alcohol, nitrous oxide, propane or other oxygen extenders. No superchargers allowed. Engine swaps between manufacturers are not permitted. Duallys using gasoline as fuel may enter this class. Street legal gasoline trucks (unable to make weight for the 6200 lb class) may enter with permission of officials. Only single turbo chargers are allowed unless factory OEM equipped. Charger must slug 2.8.
- **EXHAUST:** All vehicles must be equipped with upward pointing exhaust or if exhaust runs to the rear of the truck, it must be equipped with a turn up elbow. Two (2) 3/8" diameter bolts must be placed through the exhaust pipe

in a cross pattern within one (1) inch of each other and within twelve (12) inches of the turbo.

- **TIRES:** All tires must carry a D.O.T. number on the sidewall. No cut altered or sharpened tires. Trucks with dual rear wheels (2wd or 4wd) may enter and run in this class. Maximum 102-inch width.
- **BUMPERS:** Front bumpers must be UNALTERED if factory stock. No hanging weighted front devices are permitted. Homemade bumpers, brush guards and winch brackets and brackets for snowplow frames are permitted. A truck is permitted to compete without any front bumper.
- **HITCH:** The hitch point will be from the rear bumper or from a "REESE TYPE" hitch on a level plane with the point of attachment to the truck's frame at the center of the pumpkin of the rear end. No other types of hitches are permitted. No angled, lever, pivot, axis, or other types of "TRICK" hitches are allowed, and the hitch must be stationary in all directions. The hook point must be the furthest point to the back of the truck. Hook point must be past the bed of the truck if there is no bumper, or past the end of the bumper. Each truck must supply a hitch with a 3" x 3 ³/₄" hole to accept a sled hook. No clevis of any kind accepted. Hitch height will be 26" maximum.
- **SUSPENSION:** No solid suspensions are permitted. Suspensions must always have a minimum of one inch of movement. OEM chassis is mandatory. The vehicle must retain OEM frame rails. Traction bars and devices are permitted. Must be bolted on only. Welds permitted for attachment to frame and axle only. Lift Kits are acceptable. No weights permitted in the cab of the truck. Weights must be secured in the bed of the truck.
- **BRAKES:** Must have working brakes. No pinion brakes allowed.
- APPEARANCE: Trucks must be in stock appearance. Floor in bed must be solid. The wheelbase must not be changed from the original manufacturer. Flatbeds are permitted. Interior in the cab must be OEM. No race seats or gutted cabs permitted.
- **DRIVETRAIN:** The transmission, transfer case, front and back rear end must all be OEM and available in one ton (or smaller) pickup trucks. All trucks must have at least a six-inch-wide u-joint shield around all u-joints constructed of at least 5/16" steel or 3/8" aluminum that will safely contain the u-joint and the end of the driveshaft. All shields must be securely mounted to the vehicle. Axle shields are required. Shield must be .060" thickness steel or aluminum.
- **SAFETY:** Safety switches (rain cap or guillotine style) must shut off air to diesel engines. Switch will be securely mounted to the back of the vehicle. A 2 inch or bigger solid ring must be attached to the end of the switch. Ring must be zip tied to the switch bracket. Switch must also be able to be activated in the cab while the driver is secured in the vehicle.
- **FIRE EXTINGUISHER:** All vehicles must have a 2 ½ lb dry chemical extinguisher. Must be securely mounted within reach of the driver.
- **DRESS CODE:** D.O.T. helmet to be worn and fastened. Leather shoes or fire shoes are required. Must always wear pants and shirt. Fire Suits and gloves are highly recommended.

8200-POUND WORK STOCK DIESEL TRUCKS

- 1. 8200 pounds max weight.
- 2. Hanging weights are permitted. Suitcase weights only. No boxes.
- 3. Weight cannot hang further than 60" from the center of the front axle.
- 4. No weight in the cab.
- 5. Trucks must retain all OEM equipment and must be operable.
- 6. All trucks must have a full interior.
- 7. Drive line must be OEM from one (1) ton truck or less.
- 8. Engine may be transplanted as long as the engine is from a one ton or less truck.
- 9. Exhaust must exit behind the truck.
- 10. Diesel/Biofuel only.
- 11. Reese style hitch only.
- 12. Hitch can be braced, and bracing must be forward or downward but not in front of the center of the rear axle. Class 5 or better recommended.
- Maximum hitch height of 24" with a minimum of 3.75"x3" opening.
- 14. The hitch must not be more than 1" thick.
- 15. The hooking point must be a minimum of 44" from center of rear axle to hooking point.
- 16. Stock injection pump or dual CP3 allowed.
- 17. No AG governed P-pumps allowed.
- 18. No Nitrous, propane, or water injection.
- 19. Rear suspension can be blocked solid.
- 20. Latter or traction bars are allowed.
- 21. Tires must be DOT approved. No chains or studs.
- 22. Single rear wheel trucks 35" limit.
- 23. Dual rear wheel trucks 33" limit (if running duals, must have a dually bed)
- 24. Stock appearing turbo S 300 centers allowed no s 400 allowed.
- 25. Turbos can be used from any makes or models as long as it's off a one (1) ton or less
- 26. 6.4 Power stroke must retain factory turbo with factory intake wheels
- 27. T-3 flange only.
- 28. Trucks must run stock wheelbase.
- 29. Stock or OEM replacement, no water to air intercoolers.

6200-POUND PRO STOCK 4X4 GAS TRUCKS

- 1. 6200 pounds max weight.
- 2. Front weights may not extend more than 195 inches from the centerline of the rear axle to the furthest point. Weights may not extend more than 60 inches from the centerline of the front axle.
- 3. Two rollers must be attached to the most forward point of the bottom or side of the weight box.

- 4. No cubic inch limit.
- 5. Any aluminum cylinder heads are permitted.
- 6. Aluminum blocks are permitted.
- 7. Any intake allowed with one four-barrel carburetor.
- 8. Exhaust will exit through the hood or behind the cab.
- 9. Sheet metal must conform to the wheelbase. Fiberglass body permitted. Must have a bed floor or tonneau cover and firewall.
- 10. Any make engine allowed with any make body.
- 11. Hitch height is 26" maximum. Must be rigid in all directions. Mandatory safety hitch must be as strong as primary hitch and cannot be connected to primary hitch. Must be 12 inches below primary hitch, minimum 3/8" thick with an opening of 3.75 x 3.5". No bolts in hitches. Must be a forged pin. From the point of hook to centerline of the rear axle shall be no less than 27% of wheelbase.
- 12. Rear of the block must be 12" behind the center of the front axle tube.
- 13. Drive train will consist of the following: Any front axle, any transfer case, any rear axle. No planetaries permitted.
- 14. OEM frame rail is only permitted.
- 15. Totally enclosed bell housing is required. Must meet SFI Spec 6.1 or better. All vehicles not inspected for highway use must have manual transmission - Flywheel shield Automatic transmission - SFI Spec. 29.1flex plate. No cast iron permitted. A positive gear lockout, approved safety blanket over the torque converter area. A full-length blanket is required. Must meet SFI Spec. 4.1. Drive shaft loops and U joint shields are required.
- 16. Maximum width of the truck is 102".
- 17. No mud flaps or dirt deflectors.
- Tires must be DOT approved. 35" x 12.50. No studded tires, chains or any alterations. No bar tires and no dual tires.
- 19. Must have a kill switch.
- 20. No fuel tanks or lines in the cab.
- 21. No air suspension or hydraulic systems.
- 22. Helmet, fire jacket and gloves are mandatory. No tennis shoes open toes. Fireproof boots recommended.

8000-POUND 2.6 SMOOTH BORE DIESEL TRUCKS

- 1. 8000 pounds max weight.
- OEM Chassis is mandatory. The vehicle must retain the full OEM chassis. Wheel tubs, back half conversions and tube chassis are prohibited. Lengthening of the frame allowed up to 158". Longer trucks (158"-172") must maintain OEM measurements for the body being used.
- The body must be an OEM truck body including the full bed floor. No flatbeds permitted. The body must retain the full sheet metal. After-market hoods permitted. The hood must be closed and securely latched when hooked to sled.
- Maximum cubic inch 460. Engine must be in OEM locations for the body used. No aftermarket blocks permitted. Engine must have 3/8 cable surrounding #1

and #2 cylinders and must pass through the manifolds. 2 cables at splice with 4-6 inches of slack.

- 5. Cylinder head must be an OEM or OEM replica for the brand of engine. Outside of the cylinder head must measure factory width and length. No billet heads of any material. Head must retain factory OEM valve angle. No deck plates permitted. Side draft and aftermarket intake manifolds are allowed.
- 6. Hook point to be no closer than 44" of centerline of rear axle. Maximum hitch height of 24" with a minimum of 3.75"x 3" opening. Hitch must be stationary in all directions. Hitch must be frame mounted. The use of Reese style hitches is prohibited. Hitch must be centerline of the rear axle or behind. Hitch must not exceed 25-degree angle from pivot point to hook point. Drawbar height adjustment link if attached to rear differential housing the attaching point must be at axle centerline or below. The drawbar adjusters cannot attach to anything above the centerline of the rear axle. The adjusters must go down from the drawbar. The adjusters can only go straight downward vertically or towards rear differential housing. No slotting of holes for adjuster attachment. No hitch supports or adjusters fastened to rear axle housing shall be above the center point of the rear axle. Pivot pin of the drawbar can be no further forward than the centerline of the rear axle.
- 7. Turbo is limited to a 2.6" inducer bore. Bore must be smooth. No MAP Width Enhancement groove (MWE) allowed. Compressor Wheel must protrude into 2.6" bore for 1/8". Bore will be checked with a 2.605" turbo plug. Plug must not be able to enter the inducer bore and contact wheel.
- 8. All vehicles must be equipped with upward pointing exhaust located either directly behind the cab or out of the truck hood. Two 3/8-inch diameter bolts must be placed through the exhaust pipe in a cross pattern within one inch of each other and within 12 inches of the turbo.
- 9. Front hanging weights are allowed, not to exceed 60 inches forward from the centerline of the front axle. Ballast may be added in the bed of the truck but must be securely fastened. Maximum weight 8000 pounds.
- 10. All trucks must have at least a six-inch-wide u-joint shield around the rear u-joint constructed of at least 5/16inch steel or 3/8 aluminum that will safely contain the u-joint and the end of the driveshaft. All shields must be securely mounted to the vehicle. Any front shaft u-joints that can be visibly seen from the side of the truck must be shielded to contain the u-joint and the end of the driveshaft.
- 11. A fire extinguisher system is permitted. 2.5# a fire extinguisher must be securely mounted within reach of the driver. A complete OEM firewall is required.
- 12. All drivers must have a valid driver license and full SFI fire suit including helmet. Seat Belt/restraint must be worn.
- The complete OEM floor pan is mandatory. Vehicle must maintain a complete firewall. Additional gauges and pillar pods are permitted.
- 14. Hand throttles permitted. Diesel fuel only (See fuels page for specs) No propane or N02 or any other oxygen enhancers allowed.

plunger limit. Ag governors permitted. The use of multiple high pressure common rail fuel pumps is legal.

- 16. OEM rear and front ends required. Must have come factory in a one ton or smaller vehicle.
- 17. Axle shields are required. Shield To be .060" thickness steel or aluminum. A hole may be cut in one shield to allow operation of hub lock.
- 18. Safety switches (rain cap or guillotine) must shut off air to diesel engines. Switch will be securely mounted to the back of the vehicle. A 2 inch or bigger solid ring must be attached to the end of the switch. Ring must be zip tied to the switch bracket. Switch must also be able to be activated in the cab while the driver is secured in the vehicle.
- 19. Hydraulic steering permitted.
- 20. Suspension The upper mounting point for strut assembly must be in factory location. Adjustable caster/ 60 camber pillow ball mounts are permitted. The lower control arm may be strengthened provided the factory mounting points are maintained. Strut tower braces, lower tie bars, sway bars, and limit straps are permitted. Traction bars and devices are permitted. Raising or lowering of vehicle height with suspension modifications is permitted but must be bolted on only. Welds permitted for attachment to frame and axle only. Blocked suspension permitted. No air bags. Rear suspension may be made solid.
- Tires must be DOT approved with a maximum size of 35x12.50. Non-Studded tires or tire chains. No alterations to tires permitted. No bar or terra tires.
- 22. Dual wheels are prohibited.
- 23. OEM transmission and transfer case must be used. Must have come factory in a one ton or smaller vehicle.
- 24. Non-OEM transmissions prohibited. Aftermarket torque converters, valve bodies, and internal components are permitted.
- 25. SFI bell housing and/or SFI blow proof bell housing or SFI blanket type shield must be used.
- 26. Water injection is prohibited. Air to air intercooler only. No ice or water permitted.

- 1.Camping cost is \$200 per camper for all week of the fair. <u>A \$50 deposit is due by January 31, 2026 to hold camping spot</u> for the 2026 fair. Early Bird Registration is due September 30, 2025 for entry to a prize. If the \$50 deposit is not paid by January 31, 2026, you will not have the same camping spot as previous year AND a \$50 late fee will be charged which is non-refundable. The \$50 late fee ends on February 28th of the current year, no late applications will be accepted after that. No parking of campers before Friday morning September 4, 2026. Campers will be parked Friday, Saturday, Sunday or Monday from 8:00 a.m. to dark.
- 2. Space prices DO NOT include fair entry. Everyone staying in the camper must have and hold a ticket for the week of the fair. Tickets must be membership, season, or junior fair member or advisor wristbands. Before any camper is parked the occupants must have a camping permit and contact a fair board director. Camper permits must be visible from the outside.
- 3. All fire lanes must be kept open at all times.
- 4. Quiet hours begin at **12 midnight**. Please consider your neighbors.
- 5. All trash is to be placed in the proper containers. No sewer or gray water is permitted to be discharged on the ground.
- 6. No outside refrigeration units.
- 7. Electric cords used on campers must be #12 wire for 50 feet or less #10 wire for anything over 50 feet.
- 8. The above rules will be enforced by the Belmont County Agricultural Society. The Society reserves the right to cancel, reject or refuse any persons or campers, and will not be held responsible for accidents of any sort.
- 9. One additional car pass may be purchased for an additional \$10. Campers are allowed to have one car parked at their campsite all others are to be parked in designated parking areas/lots.
- 10. All minors must have an adult staying with them.
- 11. No alcohol in the camper area or on the fairgrounds.
- 12. Campers must be out Sunday after the fair. Campers remaining on the grounds after 8:00 p.m. on Sunday September 13, 2026, will be charged \$10 per day.

Those that do not cooperate with the above rules will be asked to leave by a Fair Board Director and will not be permitted to return. Vehicles will be towed at the owner's cost.

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
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
